**Leading From The Front**

**He leads me beside the still waters. He restores my soul; He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name’s sake. —[Psalm 23:2-3](#)**

Stephen Ambrose’s book *Band of Brothers* follows the US Army’s Easy Company from training in Georgia through the Normandy Invasion of D-Day (June 6, 1944) and ultimately to the end of World War II in Europe. For the bulk of that time, Easy Company was led by Richard Winters. Winters was an especially good officer because he led from the front. The most commonly heard words from Winters in combat were, “Follow me!” Other officers may have sought the safety of the rear areas, but if Winters’ men were going into combat, he was going to lead them.

Jesus is the one true Leader of His children. He knows what we need and where we are most vulnerable. His leading is part of what makes Psalm 23 the most beloved song in the Bible’s hymnal. In verse 2, David says that the Shepherd “leads me beside the still waters,” and in verse 3 he adds, “He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name’s sake.” These twin ideas reveal why His care is so complete. Whether it is times of refreshing and strengthening (“still waters”) or seasons of doing what pleases Him (“paths of righteousness”), we can follow Him. ## Fredericksburg Muster Saturday, 24 August 2013

F Co. will be having its now customary Aug Muster in Fredericksburg, VA to explore and tour the battlefield, and the town of Fredericksburg (Dec 1862). The tour will begin at 9:00AM at the Fredericksburg Battlefield Visitor Center, NPS site in downtown Fredericksburg on Lafayette Blvd. Everyone needs to arrive at that site by **8:45AM** so we can attend the NPS interpretive movie which starts at 9:00AM w/an admission fee of **\$2.00**. We'll then explore the NPS museum on the lower level as well as the Sunken Road and Marye's Heights actions. From here we'll car caravan, consolidating our numbers in as few vehicles as possible, thru the park to the Union breakthrough/CS counterattack point of Jackson's line (21<sup>st</sup> VA in Taliaferro's Division) as well as Prospect Hill w/a probable walk to Hamilton Crossing on the railroad which is critical in the CS defense.

Lunch will be scheduled for around 1:00PM to 2:00PM at a local restaurant to be selected, but it will likely be the Colonial Tavern or a local Irish pub which will be a sit down meal w/beer being available, and a chance for everyone to refresh and socialize. Following our meal we'll journey just north of town to the White Oak Civil War Museum. This museum created by local CW relic hunters (\$4.00 admission fee) has an excellent collection of dug relics of the battlefield areas as well as a very good interpretation of a winter hut encampment. This will conclude our

tour, but hopefully we can adjourn to Karl's, a well known local Fredericksburg ice cream emporium, for those interested. We'll plan to conclude the tour between 5-6:00PM.

You're strongly encouraged to wear your F Co t-shirts and hats to the muster in order to let the NPS know that reenactors are making use of their battlefield for historical military study, and for local Fredericksburg merchant's awareness that reenactors are spending money in their town. These points are important for F Co's image.
